Northeast Arc Raises \$3.2 million for the Disabled

REGIONAL - Northeast Arc raised more than \$3.2 million in a three-year campaign for its Center for Linking Lives at Liberty Tree Mall in Danvers that serves individuals with autism and other disabilities.

More than 150 members of the Northeast Arc community gathered last week to celebrate the success of the fundraising campaign in a vacant

Josh Kraft, president of the New England Patriots Foundation, said the center is a perfect representation of Northeast Arc's impact on people with disabilities and their families.

"Northeast Arc has been serving our communities for nearly 70 years now, and the center is really the heart and soul of their efforts," Kraft said. "This is a place that not only promotes inclusion, but also gives hope and support to families."

Northeast Arc's president and CEO, Jo Ann Simons, thanked the donors who made the center a reality, particularly building it during the COVID-19 pandemic. "I want to recognize and thank our campaign committee who stuck by us when we decided to move forward with this project during the height of a global pandemic and financial uncertainty," Simons said.

Each day, hundreds of individuals receive support from the Center for Linking Lives. A main benefit is that it serves as a centralized meeting place for Northeast Arc's clients. Northeast Arc's programs are now more accessible than ever thanks to the center's location on public transportation routes and ample parking.

Making Marine Corps Trucks More Efficient

ROWLEY - If you have been

surprised to see a 36-foot long, fiveaxle military truck hauling down Rte. 1 recently, don't worry. We are not being invaded.

It is the 60,000-pound Logistics Vehicle System Replacement (LVSR), a critical component in supplying the Marine Corps troops in hostile and extreme conditions.

The LVSR, designed and nanufactured by Oshkosh manufactured Defense, is being retrofitted here by Blackburn Energy to add the capability of operating the vehicle's communications and air conditioning without idling the engine.

When driving the LVSR, "We get a lot of strange looks," said Andrew Amigo, Blackburn's CEO and founder. The students at the Clark School, Blackburn's neighbor, love to wave to him as he drives the giant LVSR past the school, he said.

The LVSR hauls a variety of battlefield supplies, including huge bladders of diesel fuel, to forwarddeployed units. It can also act as a

tow truck for vehicles.

While sitting at a forward position in hostile territory, the retrofitted LVSR will also keep the two-Marine crew comfortable and in communication without having to idle its engine. That saves many gallons of very expensive diesel fuel.

Blackburn in partnership with Toyota Tsusho America, Inc. (TAI), is marketing the battery-driven system, known as RelGen, to the trucking industry. Its goal is to turn "all commercial vehicles into platforms that create, store, use and deliver clean energy.'

Much like a Toyota Prius harnesses kinetic energy from the car to replenish its electric batteries, Blackburn's system captures wasted energy in large trucks. The energy is

Banter Barbershop Continues Heritage of Hair

shop has long been a gathering place for men to get a trim and a shave, but even more to see old friends, make new ones, catch up on the latest, and above all, talk.

Banter Barber and Clothier, as the name suggests, embraces that tradition on State Street here and takes it several steps further.

"We yuk it up a lot," said Eric Eramo, the affable young owner.

Eramo, having learned from his mother, Ginny Eramo, owner of the highly successful INTERLOCKS Salon on Merrimac Street, and father, Tom Eramo, who owned Visions, a beauty products supply distribution company, for almost three decades, said he was inspired to open the shop and continue the family tradition by his great grandfather, Maddie Stuto.

Stuto immigrated from Sicily to South Boston at age 15 in the 1920s. He trained as a barber and opened his own shop, where he met his wife, Ruth McCormack, who came in for a trim. Unhappy with the cut -- or so the family legend goes -- she returned to the shop for a redo and that second encounter kindled their romance.

Maddie's photo, working in his

Banter took over the space on State Street, next to the Screening Room and Port Tavern, that was occupied for years by the popular antique shop, Flukes and Finds. It was not the first barbershop to rent the space. When the previous shop failed, Banter moved in at the end of July 2021 during the Pandemic.

In the last year, Banter at 80 State St. has more than doubled its business. On Friday late morning, all four chairs were filled, and there was a steady stream of customers, some dropping in for a chat, others for a trim and shave.

Banter is more than a barbershop. It is also a men's clothing store. Currently, as father Tom points out, the shop is selling golf shirts. "We have a lot of golfers" as clients, he

The atmosphere is that of a traditional gentlemen's club. The barber chairs are in the back of the shop. In front is comfortable furniture, plus a pool table, other Continued on page 3

stored in battery packs and used to electrify trucks without the need for costly infrastructure.

The long-haul trucking industry uses Blackburn's system to power the air conditioning, lights, computer and TVs for drivers overnighting in their cab without idling the engine. Today, Amigo's system can power everything on a truck including the engine cooling fan, air conditioning and liftgates,

except the powertrain.

As a result, the RelGen system increases the mileage on trucks from an average of 6.5 gallons per mile to 10 gallons, Amigo said. Its battery packs also make the truck more efficient and profitable.

Once installed on trucks worldwide, Blackburn will reduce carbon dioxide emissions in the atmosphere more than any other green measure, Amigo said.

The Marine Corps through the

U.S. Defense Innovation Unit has contracted with Blackburn to make its fleet of LVSR vehicles cleaner and more efficient.

"Blackburn is uniquely suited to solve the most difficult vehicle electrification problems presented by customers with operational needs that require the continued use of diesel platforms," Amigo said.

Blackburn is retrofitting one LVSR to demonstrate next month its capabilities to the Marine Corps.



Last week I discussed teenager sleep patterns and issues. This week we start a conversation about sleep for the majority of those reading this

My body has become accustomed to a certain amount of quality sleep. I have always had difficulty sleeping past a certain time in the morning, regardless of what time I go to bed. On the days over this holiday period that I stayed up later than I normally do, my amount of sleep hours was less and my quality of sleep tended to be lower. This had an impact on the way I felt the next day. Sleep "hygiene", including regular bedtime, is so important.

There are many reasons for poor quality sleep. Everything from a poor mattress, poor pillow, sleep position, medical issues, diet, alcohol consumption, and work schedule can have an impact on the quality of sleep that we get. Although some people can notice subtle changes in sleep quality, many others do not realize that some of the issues they have routinely can be caused from poor sleep quality.

Brighter Smiles...

INTRO TO ADULT SLEEP

Sleep plays a vital role in good health and well-being throughout our lives. The way you feel while you're awake depends in part on what happens while you're sleeping.

Sleep helps your brain work properly. Studies show that a good night's sleep improves learning. Studies also show that sleep deficiency may cause you to have trouble making decisions, solving problems, controlling your emotions and behavior, and coping with change.

Sleep plays an important role in your physical health. For example, sleep is involved in healing and repair of your heart and blood vessels. Ongoing sleep deficiency is linked to an increased risk of heart disease, kidney disease, high blood pressure, diabetes, stroke, sexual dysfunction, ADHD, obesity and depression.

Sleep issues can affect the young, the old and everyone in between. The many changes that take place in our bodies as we age can increase the risk of sleep disorders.

Sleep apnea is one of many sleep disorders. It is a serious, potentially life-threatening sleep disorder that affects approximately 18 million Americans. It comes from the Greek meaning of apnea which means 'want of breath". People with sleep apnea have episodes in which they stop breathing for 10 seconds or more during sleep.

People with sleep apnea usually do not remember waking up during the night. Some of the potential problems may include morning headaches. daytime excessive sleepiness, irritability and impaired mental or emotional functioning, excessive snoring, choking/gasping during sleep, insomnia, or awakening with a dry mouth or throat.

Some simple questions to ask yourself are: Have you been told that you snore?

Do you often feel tired, fatigued, or sleepy during daytime?

Has anyone ever told you that you stop breathing while you were asleep - or- Have you ever woken yourself up with a gasp?

Do you have high blood pressure or are you on more than one medication to control high blood pressure?

Is your body mass index greater

Are you a male with a neck circumference greater than 17 inches or a female greater 16 inches?

If you answered yes to more than two of these questions, or if there is anything else in this column that makes you believe you may not be getting the quality of sleep you would like, please discuss these with your

Ipswich BoH to Review Management Practice Plan for Mosquito Control

IPSWICH — The Ipswich Board traps of Health invites the community to attend a meeting on April 3 and provide feedback about mosquito control efforts in the coming year.

The Town is a member of the Northeast Massachusetts Mosquito Control and Wetlands Management District (NEMMC), which creates a Best Management Practice Plan for each of its 32 member communities.

The Board of Health will review and vote whether to adopt the Best Management Practice Plan for 2023 as drafted, at its meeting on Monday, April 3, beginning at 5:30 p.m. in Town Hall Room C.

NEMMC conducts mosquito control and surveillance from the middle of the spring until the beginning of the fall. This includes weekly collection of mosquitos from surveillance traps from late May through early October. Surveillance

provide data mosquito population density and diversity, and allow the NEMMC to determine the dominant humanbiting mosquitoes and potential disease vectors in local mosquitoes.

Infected mosquitos can spread several diseases, most notably West

The primary focus of control efforts in Ipswich are on freshwater larviciding, catch basin treatments, adult mosquito surveillance and testing, aerial larviciding of the salt nemassmosquito.org/

regarding marsh mosquitoes, and adulticiding.

"Community engagement and feedback are crucial to the Board's success in shaping this plan for the coming year," Public Health Director Colleen Fermon said. "Any interested residents are encouraged to attend this meeting and share their thoughts."






