# First Parish Food Pantry Expands to Help the Needy

REGIONAL – It was raining on the Friday morning before Easter when dozens of volunteers for the First Parish Food Pantry gathered, as usual, to fill bags with groceries and a special candy treat for the needy.

The rain forced the volunteers inside the 2,400-square-foot metal warehouse building instead of setting up tables outside on the parking lot. With most of the space in the building taken up with shelving to store food and other necessities, the volunteers were "squished" into a relatively small space near the door.

"It really gets small," said Jane Merrow, director of the pantry.

But this spring, that challenge will be solved when contractors, donating much of their time, will complete a new 20-foot by 39-foot addition on the south end of the building. Merrow said the original plan was to be 40 feet long, but it was cut short by a foot to keep from intruding on a neighbor.

The addition will provide space for a walk-in freezer and refrigerator, add more space for

of bread. It will be large enough for trucks to unload entire pallets of food that come from the new multi-agency hub in Salisbury.

And it will allow the volunteers on a rainy, cold day like last week to work inside in a larger space while they fill 750 bags of food. About two thirds of the bags for about 300 families are delivered by volunteers driving their cars and a van that belongs to the Seacoast Food Providers.

We are so blessed to have this big building," Merrow said. But the need in the community has the pantry bursting at the seams.

The almost 800-squarefoot addition will cost between \$130,000 and \$150,000, Merrow estimates. Those funds come from donations.

To save money, the windows in the rear of the building are being repurposed for use in the new addition

"This community is incredibly generous," Merrow said.

The pantry started in a small library of the church almost a decade ago. It quickly outgrew dry goods, including several stacks that space, as Continued on page 3

## Adopt a Horse, Save Another Horse

is one of many success stories at the New England Equine Rescue North (NEER).

An aggressive Haflinger, Marvel was thought to be a lost cause. Bought at an auction by a wellmeaning but inexperienced owner, the horse developed dangerous habits, threatening to kick any humans or animals that came near

"I was told he should be euthanized. I probably should have euthanized him." said Mary Martin, president and founder of NEER North. But thanks to the hard work of Laura Ciarletta, Mary and others at the rescue farm, Marvel was given a second, third and many more chances.

Today, the gelding has a job on a therapy farm. He also has his own Facebook page where his new caregiver posts photos of Marvel with children and other animals.

NEER North is a nonprofit equine rescue registered in Massachusetts and New Hampshire. Since 2008, it has been helping horses and owners in crisis. A safe haven, NEER

for adoption into new homes.

Since the horse and donkey rescue was formed, Mary Martin has rescued and cared for dozens of animals each year on the 13acre farm at 52 Ash Rd. This year she has more than tripled that number, caring for the large animals at three locations along the North Shore, plus others in foster care and adoption.

A total of 40 horses, ponies and donkeys are currently housed with NEER North, including 17 on site, plus three mules and three donkeys. There is also a sheep named Paisley, all of which strain the operation's capacity.

"Adopting a horse saves two: the horse you take home and the one you make room for," the web

## Pink House Supporters Face Its **Demise**

THE ROAD TO PLUM ISLAND -- The legions of Pink House supporters meet this week to discuss last-ditch efforts to keep the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service (F&WS) from demolishing the beloved house.

The meeting, scheduled for 7 p.m. Thursday, April 4 at PITA Hall, 8 Plum Island Trnpk., is billed by the Support the Pink House organization as one "You will not want to miss."

"Regardless of the headlines, we are still working on negotiations with the US Fish and Wildlife Service. It's been quite a ride! New things happen to shift the picture every day, and we are following every last option," the meeting announcement reads.

"Public outcry has only grown and that's why we keep using every minute, 7 days a week, working on the public's behalf to fulfill the mission.

## Sewer Shares Information on Expected Water Quality Regulation Changes, Offers **Guidance to Residents** GROVELAND- Superintendent Colin Stokes, Groveland Water and

Sewer Department, and the Groveland Board of Water Commissioners would like to share information regarding the expected regulation changes.

State and federal drinking water regulations are expected to change and Groveland Water and Sewer would like to share the following information about the changes.

Groveland Water and Sewer is proactively working on options for the new regulation guidelines proposed by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). Once the new regulations are accepted by the state, Groveland will be expected to take immediate action.

The current regulations for PFAS public drinking water standard or Maximum Contaminant Level (MMCL), as published in 2020 by EPA, is 20 nanograms per liter (ng/L) or parts per trillion (ppt) applicable to the community. This regulation takes into account the concentrations of six specific PFAS.

PFAS (per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances) are man-made and do not break down quickly.

Currently, Groveland is well below the standard for the MMCL and has been sampling monthly and quarterly since 2021, with steady results of 4.1075 ppt at Well 1 and 4.392 ppt at Well 3.

The water is safe to drink per the current Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection (MassDEP).

As of March 2023, the EPA released a proposed National Primary Drinking Water Regulation for PFOA and PFOS, which is 4 ppt. This regulation would cover Four additional PFAS compounds, which will be measured using a Hazard Index. A Hazard Index is a calculation based upon a formula provided by the EPA.

Regulations are determined by the maximum contaminant level due to

The Groveland Board of Water Commissioners is currently looking into a variety of options to meet these regulations. The goal is to find a solution with the least impact on residents and ratepayers. Options include:

- Building a water treatment/filtration plant in Groveland
- Finding sufficient new water sources that will comply with the upcoming PFAS regulations.
- Purchasing water from a neighboring community

The new regulations are currently expected to be adopted by the end of 2024, or early 2025. The timeline for compliance has not yet been

members who help make NEER the success it is are Hillary Lind and Nerissa Wallen.

Mary's phone rings continuously. In the last year, she has had 140 requests to take in unwanted animals from owners throughout New England who are unable to care for their horses and donkeys.

The uptick in requests, she believes, is caused by inexperienced people wanting to own a horse. She has also had a higher return rate, again because it takes hard work and money to own a horse.

A great opportunity to learn about NEER and enjoy the fun and excitement of the rescue farm is at its annual Open House from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m., June 9. The open house raises money and introduces people to the farm. The event includes barn tours, games, food trucks, a beer tent and the chance to visit with beautiful horses.

NEER North is affiliated and recognized by some of the most important organizations, including Global Federation of Animal Sanctuaries, EQUUS Foundation, Thoroughbred Aftercare Alliance, Guidestar Platinum, Massachusetts Equine Welfare Council, Equine Welfare Alliance

has many questions and the Support the Pink House board will be there to answer questions, talk about next steps and how supporters can help.

After months of reviewing proposed land swaps and public comments, the F&WS offered two options. Alternative A, which was rejected by the agency, proposed to keep the Pink House as is under its management.

Alternative B, which was selected, proposes to remove the Pink House, restore the site and open it to public use.

The only way the F&WS would keep the Pink House standing was to have a "viable land exchange" that would have taken the house out of federal ownership. It required that the land traded would be "of higher ecological value and approximately equal monetary value (as required by law)," the agency's decision states.

The estimated value was in excess of \$400,000.

"The Service and its partners actively searched for a viable land exchange option for eight years, without success," the decision states.

The Support the Pink House wrote on its website that it had proposed a variety of sites that might be traded for the Pink House. "In the past few months, we have brought them as many as 17 options that seemed to fit their criteria, several of which were seriously considered, but all ended up being rejected," the STPH wrote.

The supporters wrote that it is "inconceivable that a solution has not been accepted by FWS."

It has had plenty of time and

plenty of options, they wrote. We're mystified as to why they couldn't, or wouldn't, allow one to work."

The federal criteria kept becoming more stringent, eventually making the land trade solution impossible by their own creation.

The F&WS, which said it has no use for the Pink House, maintained that the property is not a good fit for a land exchange and to keep it is neither fiscally nor environmentally responsible.

The plan is to remove the house and restore the habitat, add benches and interpretative signage. It does not plan to build an observation platform, as once thought.

After a year of monitoring the public's use of the site, the F&WS may decide to build the proposed observation platform, or if the public has caused damage to the habitat, it may close it.

The F&WS is also assessing the feasibility of putting the Pink House up for auction to a bidder, who would have 90 days to remove and relocate it.

Jeff Ackley, the STPH treasurer, said last week that moving the Pink House would destroy the visual beauty of the house that has appealed to thousands of photographers and artists through the years.

The F&WS wrote: acknowledge and accept that the future viability of the Pink House within salt marsh that already floods routinely - and is expected to do so with greater frequency and intensity - is increasingly dire."

Maintaining the house, it wrote, would be contrary to the F&WS' primary mission to protect and conserve wildlife and their habitats, while managing for climate change.

the need for food grew for families living in Newbury and Byfield, Newburyport, West Newbury, Salisbury, Rowley, Ipswich and Georgetown.

During the Covid pandemic when in-person church services were suspended, the pantry took over the pews in the sanctuary.

Typical of the pantry's innovative leadership, the empty wooden pews, choir room and wall space became the shelves and cold storage for the food and supplies. Along with Bibles and hymnals jars of peanut butter, pies and boxes of pasta, particularly Mac and Cheese filled the pews.

Alan Bull, a local artist, teacher and illustrator, captured the organized chaos of the operations in a painting he has donated to the pantry to raise funds for the pantry's operations.

Post-Covid, when the church wanted its sanctuary back, Merrow and her legions of supporters and volunteers raised about \$320,000 to erect the current building at the rear of the church.

Now, Coffey Design and Builders, Atlantic Contract Systems and Caswell Mechanical have stepped up again to build the expansion, which will make the pantry and its volunteers even more efficient.

The "guests" of the pantry are so appreciative of the food, Merrow said, they often write thank you notes or tell the volunteer who delivers the food a story about how the food helps them.

Each Friday before the volunteers begin filling bags, Merrow said the

## Tarr and Senate to Rename Salisbury State Reservation to Honor Local Hero & Veteran

SALISBURY - On March 14, 2024, the State Senate approved the legislation SB.2701, An Act relative to changing the name of the Salisbury Beach State Reservation filed by Senate Minority Leader Bruce Tarr (R-Gloucester). This legislation aims to designate Salisbury Beach State Reservation as "Robert 'Boots' Chouinard State Reservation at Salisbury Beach. This follows a request by the town of Salisbury's Board of Selectmen that occurred at the Board

 $David\,Moon\,from\,Mass\,Audubon$ North Shore will present how Mass Audubon and other organizations and agencies all around the Great Marsh are working to restore resilience to the salt marsh, which is threatened by sea level rise and other anthropogenic impacts.

Recent advances in low-impact techniques hold great promise for helping the marsh to keep up with sea level rise, and David will share specific designs for how Mass Audubon will use them at Rough Meadows Wildlife Sanctuary in Rowley.

David Moon is Community Science and Coastal Resilience Manager for Mass Audubon North Shore and works from Joppa Flats Education Center in Newburyport, where he helps to restore coastal habitats and leads birding programs. He has been a science teacher, environmental educator, and administrator of nature center programs for 40 years. He taught science at The Putney School in VT, was Executive Director of Ashuelot Valley Environmental Observatory, in Keene, New Hampshire, was Education Director at Stonewall Farm in Keene, and teaches tropical ecology for Franklin Pierce University in Costa Rica.

It is not uncommon for me to get a strange look when I ask a patient about snoring in the dental office. After an explanation about some of the reasons I include this on my medical history form, the patient will often say, "Well, I don't snore but my spouse does. In fact, we sleep in separate bedrooms."

A better way to ask someone about snoring is to ask, "Have you been told you snore?" Snoring can be a huge nuisance to the bed partner and is actually very detrimental to both people. For those without a bed partner, snoring can be assessed with apps such as Snore Lab, which measures snoring levels throughout the

Snoring is a sign of a restricted airway, which means that there is a possible depletion of air getting into the lungs and thus the brain. You spend approximately one third of your life sleeping, which means if you live to 90 years old, you may have spent 30 years sleeping. Oxygen depletion during sleep has both short-term and long-term consequences. I

suggest a reduction of oxygen to the body can take 6-10 years off of your life. Sleep is one of the most mysterious states of being – we don't know a lot about what is going on during sleep without it being recorded. Wouldn't you want to know if your body wasn't being oxygenated properly?

A restricted airway can be caused by numerous different factors. Many times, it is developmental and starts early in life. As we age, this risk for developing a restricted airway increases with things like gaining weight, muscle tone laxity, and even sleep position. Snoring is a fluttering of soft tissue in the back of throat due to there not being enough space for air to pass through. Not only does snoring have the potential to affect your brain and the way you feel on a day-to-day basis, it also disturbs the sleep of the person sleeping next to you....and in some cases, people in other rooms.

Snoring does not mean you have sleep apnea (a serious disorder measured by a sleep test,) but is a significant risk factor. If you do have sleep apnea, you need to know this so that it can be treated and you can live a better quality of life. If you don't have sleep apnea and just snore, this can also be treated, and you may be able to make it back into your own bedroom.

Aside from snoring, if you have any of the following: familial

have read multiple studies which history of sleep apnea, history of daytime drowsiness, history of clenching/grinding, history of TMJ disorder, history of mood disorders/depression, witnessed apnea events (gasping at night), large tongue with ridges on the sides, tooth wear, high blood pressure, gastric reflux, large neck (Males >17 / Females>16) – you should discuss this with your physician and/or your dentist.

There are different ways to treat snoring and/or sleep apnea including positional therapy (sometimes a wedge pillow strapped to your back so you can't roll onto your back), a CPAP device (positive air pressure through the nose to keep the airway open), or a dental device (to keep the jaw and tongue from falling back).

Just like exercising and good eating habits are good for the body, quality sleep vital to good health. Just because you get 7-8 hours of sleep doesn't mean it is good sleep. Don't hesitate to talk with your doctors about your sleep issues.....and encourage the loud person sleeping next to you to do the same.
