Gateway May Be Four 'Classic' Homes

NEWBURYPORT – By next spring, one of five major entrances to this historic city will likely be transformed from a collection of largely non-descript homes and buildings to four "classic" new homes that will share a dock on the Merrimack River.

"Coming across the bridge, people will say, 'That looks good'," said Heather Rogers with One Group Nest, who represented the buyer Eric Primack.

The new homes at a Chain Bridge gateway to Newburyport "will be classic homes with modern materials and some interesting architectural elements in keeping with Newburyport architecture," Rogers texted.

The property, at 5, 7 and 11 Spofford St.; 570 and 572 Merrimac St., on 5.5 acres is adjacent to multi-million homes that line the riverfront.

The city's Historical Commission last week approved a year's delay for the demolition of three existing homes at the rotary near the entrance to Moseley Park. The homes are considered historic by the commission because they were built at least 75 years ago.

Other buildings on the property that slopes down to the river are probably not 75 years old. They too would be demolished, allowing the developer to petition the city to redraw the property

lines for four homes.

Primack, who has restored several historic homes in Newburyport and in other towns on the North Shore, is working with Rogers to draw the renderings for the new homes.

"We have only begun our research in the design features," Rogers texted.

Rita Mihalek, a board member for the Newburyport Preservation Trust, opposed the demolition. "The loss of these historical buildings at the entrance to the city would be a shame," she said.

The property is near the Chain Bridge, considered the nation's oldest continually occupied, long-span bridge. Built in 1910, it replaced the nation's first suspension bridge, constructed in 1810 to replace a series of bridges since 1793.

The 5.5 acres, which is selling for less than the \$3.9 million asking price, will close in August, Rogers said. In addition to the Historical Commission, Primack and his team will face scrutiny by other regulatory boards, including the Zoning Board of Appeals.

Primack and Rogers said Modern Homes in Topsfield will build the four homes. According to its web site, "Modern Heritage builders excel at the art of fine home building in New England, where Continued on page 3

Could the Pink House Be Licensed?

PLUM ISLAND TURNPIKE – Maybe the non-profit Support the Pink House organization (STPH) could take a page from the Salisbury Historical Commission and propose to the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service (F&WS) that it license the almost 100-year-old icon while the community maintains the house.

The F&WS currently plans to tear down the Pink House and replace it with benches and possibly an observation platform to view the marsh.

In STPH's well-attended meeting last week at PITA Hall on Plum Island, frustrations with the F&WS boiled over, prompting one supporter to call for Matt Hellman, the director of the Parker River Wildlife Refuge, to resign.

Suzann Dee, a Pink House supporter, wrote on Facebook, "It's shameful to read the absolute nonsense the Parker refuge has been allowed to put out as official statements from a governmental agency. They are hoodwinking everyone"

In its Environmental Assessment of the Pink House, Hellman wrote: "While we regret not reaching an outcome that satisfies all, we're confident the decision aligns with our **Continued on page 3**

Afghan Refugee Housing Discussed

REGIONAL - The Greater Newburyport Housing Choice Coalition has invited Rev. Jared Mercer, pastor of St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Newburyport, to speak about how the community provided housing for five Afghan refugee families.

Rev. Mercer will provide an update on the efforts to find permanent housing for these families and discuss how the community can support them.

The First Religious Society and St. Paul's have played a major role in providing housing for the five Afghan families since 2021.

The next meeting of the housing coalition will be at 6 p.m. on Thursday at the Newbury Town Library on Lunt St. It will hear progress reports from its working groups (legislative, communication/outreach and projects) and will discuss housing-related news and area happenings.

To combat the low inventory of homes on the North Shore, the coalition was formed to support housing equity and justice in the Greater Newburyport area. It believes people of all income levels, abilities, households and stages of life should be able to live in communities that are welcoming and inclusive.

In addition to encouraging the reuse of existing structures, the coalition supports the creation of new housing and upgrading existing housing for households with low incomes or special needs.


The ESL classes will run through June 3. The fee is \$89. Classes are open to anyone in the Greater Newburyport region.

mission to protect and restore highquality wildlife habitat and provide meaningful educational opportunities."

Constructed in 1925, the Pink House is a three-bedroom, two-story former private residence on the Plum Island Turnpike in Newbury, surrounded by the salt marsh and tidal creek.

At the government agency's suggestion, the STPH has sent five possible land parcels that could be traded for the Pink House. All five parcels, which met most of the criteria the agency set, have been rejected.

Across the Merrimack River, the Salisbury commission last week sent a proposed draft of a 10-year license from the U.S. Coast Guard for the Butler's Toothpick, a navigation marker on the river, to the SelectBoard and Town Manager Neil Harrington.

The Coast Guard's is asking the town to buy a liability insurance policy for the marker, officially named the Black Rock Day Beacon, that has been guiding mariners along the river since 1873.

"The Coast Guard is enthusiastic. It would like to have the Toothpick restored," said Connie Hellwig, chair of the Salisbury Historical Commission recently. After talking with Coast Guard officials for six years, she said licensing the Toothpick is a workable solution.

The commission's plan is to rebuild the Toothpick to its original height of 35 feet and 20 feet wide.

When asked about licensing the Pink House, Nick Anastasi, an attorney with the Pierce Atwood firm, said licensing it from the federal government is one option the F&WS lists in its regulations, but has never pursued.

The F&WS posted its draft Environmental Assessment of the Pink House after the 30-day public comment period gave supporters little hope it could be saved. The agency declared the comments offered "No Significant Impact" on its plan to demolish the Pink House, although 78 percent of the public comments advocated for the federal agency to preserve the Pink

"So none of that comment period was ever going to be taken seriously?' asked Susann Dee.

The F&WS wrote that it did make "notable improvements" to its plan, including offering to put the Pink House up for auction. "If successful, the community could continue drawing inspiration from it at another site or in another form," the agency wrote.

Jeff Ackley, the STPH treasurer, said in an earlier interview that moving the Pink House off its isolated location on the edge of the salt marsh would greatly reduce the scenic appeal of one of the most painted and photographed buildings on the North Shore.

The federal agency maintains in its assessment that it has conducted "an exhaustive search" for the last seven months for a suitable property that could be exchanged for the house and 1 acre it sits on.

"No viable exchange parcels were located," the environmental assessment

new and old, antique and contemporary, and high-tech and old school intersect across structures, projects and goals."

Lisa Newman, who represented the owners, said, "No matter who decides to buy it, they will be creating a lasting legacy to be admired for years to

The property has 250 feet of riverfront access for all four homeowners.

The three homes that are scheduled for demolition in a year are 5 and 11 Spofford St. and 570 Merrimack St., all of which face the rotary.

The home at 5 Spofford, built in 1869, is in "rough condition," said attorney Douglas Deschenes with the law firm of Finneran and Nicholson. The home at 11 Spofford was built in 1879, and the home at 570 Merrimac St. was built in 1914.

Deschenes presented little information to the commission about the history of the homes, but promised to do more research.

Glenn Richards, commission chair, said it is believed that the property was once a lumber yard owned by the father of shipbuilder and mayor George Jackman Jr.

The last owner of what came to be known as the Barkley Estate was created by Lou Barkley, a quiet genius who with a third-grade education solved mechanical and engineering problems at Barkley Engineering that baffled engineers with master's degrees.

Barkley, who died in 2011 at age 90, bought the property because the loam in the soil was good. One of 13 children in a Seabrook, NH family that grew up without running water and electricity, Barkley went to work for his uncle, a machinist in Amesbury and demonstrated a remarkable talent, working with a lathe and other equipment.

He fell in love with the property on the Merrimack River, according to his nephew, Winthrop (Win) Martin, who lived in the main house for several years. His uncle's favorite pastimes were mowing the lawn and hitting golf balls into the river.

"I can't imagine how many golf balls are at the bottom of the river," Martin

Barkley worked for yacht owners, other local businesses and the city of Newburyport. He once solved an implacable challenge on one of the popular rides at Salisbury Beach, his nephew recalled.

He also raised bees and served as the city's beekeeper.

The hard-working Barkley had an inventor's mind and invented a patented machine to inject jelly into donuts that Dunkin Donuts used. He also created a way to insert paper between the layers of cheesecake.

Martin said of his uncle, "He thought outside the box," a legacy that Eric Primack and team have now shouldered for this gateway property.






poor communication and inability to relate to the patient's specific needs. This dentist looked in both their mouths and said they each "needed' 8 crowns. It didn't make sense to them. It seemed too complicated, expensive and unnecessary.

The second "new" dentist took a different approach and spent time with the couple discussing their current situation and future objectives. They both wanted to keep their teeth but still had trouble coming to grips with the fact that they "needed" significant dental work to accomplish their objective. Why couldn't they continue on the same simple path they had with their original dentist?

Dentists are sometimes more interested in what they are saying than patients are. It is important to remember that the teeth are attached to a person; and that person has their own story that goes along with their teeth.

People put different values on different things. Whether we sell cars, trips, hairstyles or teeth, the objective of the "seller" is to make the prospective "buyer" aware of what they have and all the possibilities that are available to them. It is always the consumer's decision. While there is a health component to dentistry, you can compare any other aspect

became patients. The problem was examples to teeth. Things that come to mind: comfort, looks, self-esteem, and functioning in life.

To "buy" anything, people have to be ready. What makes someone ready? They are ready when they feel the need to act. In the absence of readiness, over-education by the "seller" often feels like sales pressure to the buyer. I'm sure you have experienced this if you have ever been to a car dealership.

I love analogies. I especially love car analogies as they relate to dentistry. Cars are easy because most of us rely on them every day, just like our teeth. Some of us like simple cars, while others like fancier cars. Some take better care of their cars and they last longer. Others abuse their cars and they need more repairs. One thing is certain; maintenance is the key to long-term success of the car.

Raising awareness is a difficult task for anyone promoting their product or service. Acting on something is only accomplished when value is realized. Some end up seeing the value in their life and others do not.






