Could Newbury Take the Pink House?

PLUM ISLAND TURNPIKE -The fight to save the nearly 100-year-old Pink House continues, although the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service (F&WS) has handed it over to the federal General Services Administration (GSA) to auction it off.

If an auction of the Pink House were to succeed, a private owner would have to remove it from its current site. If it failed, the F&WS, a division of the U.S. Department of Interior, is expected to proceed with its well-publicized plan to demolish the house by winter.

We are told the house will go up for auction very shortly," the Support the Pink House (STPH) all-volunteer organization wrote in a new post on its

But as bleak as the situation for the Pink House looks, a new option has emerged, according to the non-profit

already surplus Pink House could be returned to the town of Newbury, which has expressed an interest in reclaiming a much needed home and returning it to the town's tax rolls.

"This certainly is a fresh solution, and one that we endorse," said

Rochelle Joseph, the STPH president. "Needlessly demolishing the house at an estimated cost of \$50,000 to \$90,000 is not the best use of our tax dollars, especially when you add in the federal funds spent to buy it.



A Lot of Boxers to Adopt

REGIONAL After Massachusetts Society for Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (MSPCA) found homes for many of its dogs during last week's Adoptathon, its shelters are back to full capacity when 60 boxers were surrendered to police as part of a severe hoarding situation.

"I'll be frank: it's a lot of dogs," said Neal Litvack, president. "We haven't done an intake of this scale in a really long time, but we certainly weren't about to turn our backs on innocent animals.

MSPCA staff immediately placed the boxers in three area shelters: Boston, Nevins Farm in Methuen and Salem. The action was part of a multi-jurisdictional investigation into overcrowding and hoarding.

The owner handed over the dogs without incident, the police said. Merrimac Det. Stephen Beaulieu is the lead investigator. Anyone with information should call the Merrimac police at 978-346-8321.

The dogs appeared to be healthy, but they were still being examined by MSPCA officials. The examinations will determine any possible legal action against the owner.

The MSPCA is not sure yet what kind of care the dogs will require, but they will at least need spay/neuter procedures and dental care, Litvak wrote in an email.

That care is expected to cost \$10,000. Most of the dogs will be available for adoption once they have undergone the necessary medical and behavioral tests. For information about adopting a boxer, visit www.mspca.org/ adoptadog or make a donation at: www.mspca.org/boxers.

Georgetown Override Failure Forces Cuts in Planned **Budget Increases**

GEORGETOWN - The schools, percent to \$17.6 million. police and fire departments may have to take a sizable financial hit next year to balance the town's budget after the voters turned down a proposed \$3 million property tax hike.

The town has called a Special Town Meeting at 7 p.m., Monday, June 24, in the auditorium of the High/Middle School, 11 Winter St.

SelectBoard Chair Daryl Lamonica last week urged as many residents as possible to attend. "It's you, the residents, who will decide this budget," he said at the SelectBoard meeting.

According to an official spreadsheet, the schools may lose about \$300,000 in the proposed new budget. This year, the schools' budget is \$17.8 million and the proposed budget approved at

The town budget for public safety would increase by 1 percent from \$2.87 million this year to \$2.9 million next year. The police and fire chiefs had hoped their budgets would increase to \$3.3 million, that was approved at the May Town Meeting to allow the hiring of more officers and firefighters.

The police department budget this year is \$1.7 million. Town Meeting raised it to \$1.8 million, but the proposed budget scheduled for a vote at the Special Town Meeting is \$1.67 million, a reduction of 2.5 percent.

The fire department may have the largest cut at 6.7 percent. The current budget is \$662,471. The Town Meeting increased it to \$933,384, but

Newburyport Fire Department Extinguishes Basement Fire

NEWBURYPORT — Fire Chief Stephen Bradbury III reports that the Newburyport Fire Department extinguished a basement fire on Tuesday after-

On Tuesday, June 4, at approximately 3:12 p.m., Newburyport Fire was called to 25 Duffy Drive for a report of a structure fire.

Companies arrived to find smoke showing from a rear basement bulkhead

A resident who was inside the home looking for a cat was helped outside by a Newburyport Police Officer.

Firefighters stretched a hose line into the basement to extinguish a small fire. Fire damage was contained to the basement of the home.

Much of the home was filled with smoke so firefighters also ventilated the home and evaluated two residents for smoke inhalation. Both residents declined medical transport. Both of the residents' cats were later found in good health by

Off-duty Newburyport firefighters covered Newburyport Fire Headquarters. The cause of the fire remains under investigation by the Newburyport Fire Department, but it appears to be accidental.

Merrimac Police Remove 60 Dogs from Property During Animal Welfare Investigation, Appeal for Adopters

 $\label{eq:MERRIMAC} \textbf{MERRIMAC} \ -- \ \text{On Tuesday, June} \quad \text{reside in shelters.}$ 11, 60 Boxer dogs were removed from a property in the Town of Merrimac as part of a multi-jurisdictional investigation into reports of animal hoarding and overcrowding.

The investigation was opened by the Windham Police Department, NH, and also involves the Merrimac Police Department, Haverhill Police Department, and the Massachusetts Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (MSPCA).

The Boxer dogs were voluntarily surrendered by the Locust Grove Rd homeowner, and have been placed in the care of the MSPCA and currently

As part of the investigation, Haverhill Police also searched another property in that town, however the search did not discover any dogs or find cause for concern.

"Every domesticated animal has a right to minimum standards of nutrition, sanitation and veterinary care," Merrimac Police Department Chief Eric Shears said. "Animal hoarding and overcrowding is dangerous because it jeopardizes the ability of animals to receive appropriate care, and we will investigate any reports of those occur-

The multi-jurisdictional investigation

is active and ongoing. No charges have been filed at this time. The lead investigator assigned to the case at Merrimac Police is Detective Stephen Beaulieu. Anyone with information is asked to call Merrimac Police at 978-346-8321.

"The Pink House would be useful to the town, which would then continue to contribute to the region's economy and tourism."

A high-level meeting of local, state and federal officials is being developed in hopes of saving the Pink House.

The F&WS has stated it plans to demolish or remove the Pink House, the most photographed and painted icon on the North Shore, and replace it with several benches for viewing the marsh and a handful of parking spaces off the Plum Island Turnpike.

"The view of the marsh would be essentially the same that the Greenbelt (land trust) has 300 yards down the turnpike," said Jeff Ackley, a STPH Board member.

The F&WS wants about \$425,000 in equivalent marshland owned by a non-profit group in exchange for the house and acre on the marsh. It has worked independently and with the STPH for months trying to identify an appropriate tract of land that could be traded for the Pink House.

If the house is auctioned off by the government, the STPH Facebook post states: "the house would be taken away, broken apart or whole, to another location. And the perpetual preservation restriction that STPH worked hard to create through the MA Historical Commission, to ensure its signature silhouette and pink color would forever stay the same, would not transfer with

the house."

The STPH has not stopped looking for solutions, because its members want to keep on fighting, Joseph said. "This is not dying down - and we have had nonstop calls telling every elected official



Ipswich Fire Department Extinguishes Fire in Commercial Structure

IPSWICH — Fire Chief Paul Parisi reports that the Ipswich Fire Department extinguished a working fire in a commercial building on Mitchell Road.

On Wednesday, June 12, at about 11:14 a.m., the Ipswich Fire Department received a commercial fire alarm activation at D&D Manufacturing, 49 Mitchell

Ipswich Police Patrolman Pat Carlin was first to arrive and discovered smoke

showing from the building.
Upon arrival, Engine 2 found smoke showing and a fire burning in an HVAC unit in the ceiling of a manufacturing space leased by C&C Fabricating. The fire alarm was sounding and the building was evacuated.

Engine 2, under the command of Lt. Pat Dingle, stretched a hose line into the

building and knocked down the fire. A primary search was conducted. Off-duty and call firefighters from Ipswich, along with mutual aid firefighters, overhauled the building to ensure the fire was completely out.

The fire was brought under control in about 45 minutes. There were no reported injuries.

A portion of the building was closed following the fire. Chief Parisi estimates damage to the building at about \$50,000. The property is owned by K Three Realty, LLC and is assessed at \$1,073,600.

The Rowley Fire Department provided mutual aid at the scene. ActionEMS was on standby, and the Rehab 5 truck provided rehabilitation support for firefighters at the scene. Firefighters from Topsfield and Essex covered Ipswich stations.

The cause of the fire remains under investigation by the Ipswich Fire Department but is not considered suspicious.

the proposed budget for the fire department at the Special Town Meeting is \$706,919.

The communications center would remain at the same level that the Town Meeting approved at \$327,890, a \$23,500 increase over the current budget.

At the Special Town Meeting next week, residents will also be asked to postpone spending money to replace the carpet in the school auditorium, the room the vote will be taken in. Also postponed would be proposed masonry repairs at the school.

In addition, the town may not buy a cell phone repeater. And the proposal is to cut \$150,000 in curriculum and instructional materials.

If approved at the meeting on Monday, proposed new carpeting for Town Hall will be postponed.

Also on the chopping block is a septic system at Camp Denison and testing at

the landfill for per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS), which can pollute the town's water. Town Administrator Orlando Pacheco told the SelectBoard last week that the threat to the water system was minimal.

The tree warden would see no cut of the proposed \$18,000 that was approved in May. But several regulatory boards and commissions may see major

Health Department, Conservation Commission and Planning Board, all of which would oversee the proposed new G. Mello Trash Corp.'s transfer station, will each see significant cuts.

The Health Department's budget this year is \$168,000, and the town meeting in May increased it to \$182,358. If approved Monday night, the special town meeting would cut the Health Department's budget to \$143,339.

The Planning Department's budget for this year is \$142,895. The regular Town Meeting increased it to \$146,000. The Special Town Meeting proposes to cut the Planning Board to \$103,000.

The Conservation Commission's budget was cut almost in half from its current level of \$96,257. The regular Town Meeting cut it to almost \$59,000, but the Special Town Meeting cut it another \$5,000.

Cultural and recreational activities was increased by \$20,000 in May to \$105,320, only to face being cut next week to \$20,000.

Brighter Smiles... HEALTH REQUIRES ACCOUNTABILITY

Dental hygienists love it when they make suggestions to patients about home care and their dreams are answered when the patient returns 6 months later with noticeable improvement. It might be as simple as adding a good electric toothbrush or waterpik to the patient's regimen. I would like to say that we are amazed daily by the fruits of our counseling, but that isn't the case. For whatever reasons there are, changing routines is often difficult.

Over 10 years ago I wrote a column about an article I saw in a magazine, which is apparently also a book, entitled "Change or Die". What if you were given that choice? What if the doctor said you had to make tough changes in the way you think and act – or your time would end soon? Could you change? Here are the scientifically studied odds: nine to one. That's nine to one against you. I don't think we have made much headway on this over the past 10 years.

It's a pretty common theme. As Americans, we're dying at a rapid rate from five basic self-induced health problems. We eat too much. We drink too much. We smoke too much. We have too much stress. And, we don't exercise enough. These five poor choic-

es, manifested in scores of ailments, consume the vast majority of the nation's healthcare budget. The article is an outpouring of concern from healthcare experts and doctors, all looking for a way to change the behavior of people who love their lifestyle so much that they literally die from it.

In a Johns Hopkins study a while back, 9 of 10 heart surgery patients chose to return to their unhealthy lifestyle, rather than make the changes needed to live longer. Only a few are convinced by their doctors to make radical daily changes. One of the more successful doctors with this is Dr. Dean Ornish, founder of the Preventive Medicine Research Institute. He says NO to meat, fatty dairy products, alcohol and oil. His vegetarian diet is lowfat, high-maintenance and strict. And, it has been shown to reverse heart disease and other factors in patients who were destined for quadruple bypasses or worse, eternal sleep.

When 90% of patients are back to their old tricks within weeks of openheart surgery, his program is the one making a difference. How does he do it? Well, it's easy, really. Dr. Ornish coaches his patients to make changes strictly for the benefit of making them. Instead of telling them they must change or face death, he encourages them to change so that they can enjoy the endless beauty of living. With dedicated support, three-quarters of his patients are still going strong three years into their drastic lifestyle shift. I'm sure it is deeply gratifying to know that it only takes words said a certain way to make a true change in someone's life.

Why is it so difficult to get people to change? Well, it depends. You have to be sick and tired of being sick and tired, usually, before you'll make the leap and let go of whatever the resistance is to change. For many, doing more

preventively never happens. We wait for chest pain to strike or a toothache to occur before seeking help to solve our crisis problem. Then we hope, and many times expect, that our problem can be solved easily and not too much will have to change to prevent it from happening again.

Dr. Ornish would tell you the change must be profound. He would tell you to never have another cheeseburger. Your hygienist would say you need to follow a new strict homecare routine, radically different than what you currently do. Making changes like these has to mean more to you than the change itself. You must be invested in improving the quality of your life.
