Town of Middleborough Files Suit Over MBTA Communities Act

Statement from the Town of Middleborough, Mark A. Germain, selectboard chair, Jav McGrail, town manager:

The Town of Middleborough has filed a lawsuit after being arbitrarily, and in our belief incorrectly declared "non-compliant" with the MBTA Communities Act.

Middleborough has been a leader in providing for responsible growth opportunities and access to housing, including affordable housing, for decades. Although the Town has clearly demonstrated that it is in compliance with the Act, it has been severely penalized because its choice of compliance methods is different than what a computer model says that an MBTA Community should look like.

"For generations, Middlebor-ough's leaders have been thoughtful, responsible stewards of its future. While many towns have fought growth, we've embraced it and are a stronger community because of it," said Town Manager Jay McGrail. "The one-size-fits-all interpretation of the MBTA Communities Act is unreasonable and is not what the Legislature intended. What we've done in Middleborough should be modeled and celebrated, not punished."

The lawsuit, filed Friday, Feb. 28 in Plymouth Superior Court, names Gov. Maura Healey, the Commonwealth of Massachusetts and the Massachusetts Executive Office of Housing and Livable Communities as defendants. The suit con-

tends that:

• The Town is in compliance with the requirements of the MBTA Communities Act today and it does not need to alter its zoning to accommodate the needs of those who wish to call Middleborough home.

• In the Act, MBTA Communities are required to have one reasonably sized zoning district, within

a half-mile of the MBTA station, that allows multi-family residential housing as of right and that has a minimum gross density of more than 15 units per acre.

• In 2021, with the praise and approval of the prior administration, Middleborough enacted a Smart Growth Zoning District that is comprised of 40.4 acres, all within a half-mile of an MBTA Commuter rail station and where multi-family housing is allowed of right at a density of 20 units per

Middleborough not only created the required zoning district, but it is actively

'Not the News We Hoped to Deliver'

PLUM ISLAND - Despite having the governor, the state Senate minority leader, a state representative and hundreds of passionate volunteers in its corner, The 100-year-old Pink House will be torn down by March 30.

The eagles and other birds that rested on its chimney and the artists who loved to paint and photograph the house standing on the edge of the marsh will watch in horror this month as what's left of the old house is demolished and hauled away.

In its place, if anything in this period of the federal government downsizing, will be a bench for nature lovers and possibly school students to watch the wildlife that frequent the marsh.

In hindsight, the federal government,

which purchased the house in 2011 never really had a plan for it. The Parker River National Wildlife Refuge, part of the U.S. Fish & Wildlife (F&WS), purchased The Pink House and its 9.3 acres on Plum Island Turnpike for \$375,000, stating it

planned to use it as temporary shelter for visiting staff and scientists. That plan never thanked the community "for its incredible patience as we all awaited news about the materialized.

Under the headline, Not the News We Hoped to Deliver, the indefatigable Support the Pink House (STPH) organization,

Herculean efforts to save the iconic Pink House. FWS will proceed with demolition before the end of March.

PLUM ISLAND - In 1925, Gertrude W. Cutter bought land on the edge of the Great Marsh to build a house for her son, his wife and eventually her grandson. The house has stood with the marsh as its backdrop for a century.

In addition to its various private and government ownerships, The Pink House has become a favorite among artists and tourists.

In honor of the house's 100th birthday, Sandy Tilton and Kathy Culbert, popular Pink House Artisans, have collaborated to plan an all-day celebration on June 14.

From 9 a.m. to 4 p.m., the public is invited to view some of the best Pink House photographs and paintings.

"The Pink House has and will continue to be an important part of this community!" Tilton wrote. "I am

Civil War Roundtable of the Merrimack

"Gilmor's Maryland Raid of 1864: a Monocacy Side Story," will be presented by

In the early summer of 1864, Robert E. Lee sent Gen. Jubal Early into Maryland near Frederick, to threaten Washington from the north and draw Union troops away from Petersburg. It was also to show the northern public that Lincoln had no grasp on the war and perhaps sway the election that fall.

This would culminate at Monocacy Junction in a battle against Gen. Lew Wallace on July 9, 1864.

However, a side story to this is a daring, almost insane plan by R.E. Lee to have some Confederates storm Point Lookout, a P.O.W. camp, at the southern point where the Chesapeake Bay and Potomac River meet, and free thousands of Rebel prisoners manpower Lee was in need of.

Gen. Bradley T. Johnson was put in charge of this raid and a section of this endeavor was the raid by Harry Gilmor across the state of

Gilmor, a Marylander from Towson, a town just north of Baltimore, executed the raid, virtually cutting a line west-toeast all the way to the bay, which severed communication and rail service between the Baltimore/Washington area and points north of the Mason-Dixon.

This program will be presented by Bill

and past-president of the CWRT of New Hampshire. A former radio announcer, Bill is author of the book, Newburyport and the Civil War (History Press 2012), and is a professional voice-over artist and writer.

Although having New England family roots, as a youngster, Bill grew up in Maryland north of Baltimore and can offer a detailed perspective on the raid and the impact on Maryland. ♦

A Real-World Civics Lesson: North Hampton School Students to Cast Ballots on Town Meeting Day

North Hampton School have a comfort dog?

It's an important question, and among several that students in Grades K-8 will be considering on Town Meeting Day as they cast ballots alongside their parents and

Through "Local Government in New Hampshire," students are developing a deeper understanding of civics and the importance of voting in a democratic society.

The civics project aligns with SAU 21's Extended Learning Opportunity (ELO) initiative. These optional enrichment programs allow students to lead targeted projects with the support of a mentor. The student election seeks to encourage inquiry-based learning, critical thinking, and problem-solving.

The Town of North Hampton and North

Hampton School have developed a strong bond through community-based projects. ELO efforts include the Senior Citizens Dance and Student Road Safety Exploration. Beyond ELOs, the school's Student Government and Town have collaborated on Earth Day clean-up efforts, while the Conservation Commission has provided its expertise and support to the school's Forestry Stewardship Program.

Town Manager Michael Tully suggested holding a student election day alongside the Annual Town Meeting on March 11. Assistant Principal and Curriculum Coordinator Rebecca Carlson approached Town Moderator Bobbi Burns, who supported the idea enthusiastically.

Middle School students Adeline Hass and Siena Donatelli brainstormed potential warrant articles. They shared their ideas with the Leadership Council, which consists of school administrators and seven teachers. The Council provided vital feedback. Students then spoke with other adults, such as the School Resource Officer and school counselor, before finalizing the articles.

Student-voters will consider three questions:

- Should North Hampton School investigate integrating a comfort dog into the school community?
- How would you like the School Resource Officer to spend time with your class?
- Should the tetherball equipment be reintroduced to middle school students?

Hass and Donatelli also held voter

NORTH HAMPTON, N.H. – Should registration drives by speaking in K-5 forth Hampton School have a comfort dog? classrooms about Town Meeting Day and the importance of having their voices heard. Students will make voter registration cards in the coming weeks.

Students will cast their ballots in a special area of the school gym, which will have voting booths and its own ballot box.

"We hope to get our students excited about exercising their vote and civic engagement but also encourage more of our families to take the time to participate in our local election," Carlson said.

Students will learn the results — and the chance they will be getting a comfort dog on March 12. ♦

DA Asked to Review Alleged Payroll Fraud

GEORGETOWN – The SelectBoard asked Town Administrator Orlando Pacheco last week to refer an unsubstantiated charge of payroll fraud by the Conservation Commission to the Essex County District Attorney or the state Attorney General.

The referral was approved unanimously to meet a Feb. 24 deadline by the state Office of Inspector General (OIG) to comply with the agency's recommendations, although the OIG found no crime had been committed by the Conservation Commission members or its former conservation agent, Steven Przyjemski.

OIG Jeffrey S. Shapiro wrote in a letter to town officials his office could not uphold an allegation, made by town officials in April 2023 that the former town conservation agent had committed fraud when he left his office during the afternoons to check on wetland and waterway properties.

Pacheco recommended that the town refer the issue to county or state law enforcement because his office has not been able to secure certain emails.

BOS Chair Daryl Lamonica told the board the district attorney or attorney general would have to have probable cause to open an investigation. Pacheco said there is probable cause, but did not elaborate.

The working ability of town-owned emails has been an issue throughout town agencies for several years, board members said. SelectBoard member Rachel Bancroft, who has been using the town's email system for 10 years, said the system does not always work well.

"There have been huge problems with the (email system)," she said.

Pacheco said the issues have been resolved. The OIG ordered the town last fall to implement better controls on how employees report the hours they worked, particularly when an employee is out of town hall.

The OIG recommended that the town "Establish a timekeeping system to track the work hours and activities of town employees. This system should include detailed record requirements for out-of-office work, including dates, times, and locations."

Shapiro recommended that the town administrator supervise all employees' timesheets, not the volunteer board members who are not regularly in town hall.

It also recommended that the town maintain better records on the mileage for trips charged by employees for using personal vehicles when doing town work.

Those recommendations, which the OIG gave the town 60 days to implement, would

cover all employees, not just the conservation agent. Pacheco secured a 30-day extension, which expired this month.

Pacheco and a few SelectBoard members have repeatedly said the Conservation Commission committed fraud in its payroll. It employed a private detective firm, The Stirm Group, to investigate the possible fraud. No report from the private detectives has been made public.

Przyjemski, who worked for the town for 17 years, resigned in January of 2023, claiming Pacheco had created a "toxic environment" for him at town hall. Following a shouting match between the two town employees in town hall, Przyjemski filed a police report about the encounter with Pacheco.

Michelle Grenier, who had her own conflict with the town administrator over her salary and mileage charged to the town, replaced Przyjemski as the conservation

igent.

Przyjemski and commission members, who supervised his work, said he left his office at town hall to see properties that were the subject of the conservation commission's regulations. The conservation commission oversees encroachment of the town's waterways and wetlands.

In a letter to the SelectBoard, the Conservation Commission chairs and the town administrator, the OIG wrote, "neither the town nor the Commission maintained adequate records of the former agent's out-of-office working hours. The insufficient recordkeeping impeded the OIG's ability to determine whether the former conservation agent performed out-of-office work in the afternoon or committed payroll fraud by leaving work early."

The OIG also found that the town administrator appears to be the designated supervisor of the conservation agent position, but in practice the volunteer commission chair supervised the former agent.

"The town did not address this ambiguity by clearly delineating the position with direct supervisory responsibility over the conservation agent, creating confusion and a lack of accountability on the part of the town administrator and the Commission chair," the OIG letter stated.

The solution, according to the OIG, is "establishing an accurate timekeeping system, implementing internal controls, and adopting improved policies for personal vehicle use will provide transparency and increase the public's confidence in its town government."

facilitating the development of affordable multi-family housing, where 26 units have already been constructed and sold and 148 more are in the development stage. These units are all within a half-mile from the MBTA station and are in addition to the existing 881 multi-family housing units within one mile of the station.

Instead of being celebrated for its innovation and achievements, Middleborough has been vilified and severely penalized because the State's computer model says it should be doing more.

Despite meeting both the letter and the spirit of the Act, the state considers the Town in noncompliance.

The State Auditor has determined that compliance with the Act constitutes an unfunded mandate, and that communities cannot be compelled to comply.

Despite the Auditor's determination, the state has made no effort to quantify the costs associated with complying with the Act, and the Attorney General has maligned the Auditor simply for doing her job.

Then, within days of claiming that Middleborough missed an arbitrary compliance deadline, State agencies, including the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education, informed Middleborough that it would no longer be receiving millions of dollars in state aid, which was promised to reimburse Middleborough for money it spent in reliance on those grants.

The Commonwealth has taken badly needed funding for public schools and capital projects, including projects to create greater access to persons with disabilities, and if these funds are not restored, essential public services are at risk.

The Town has been provided with no opportunity to appeal the state's determination, leaving the courts as the only remedy.

"If Governor Healey and her team would like to learn about responsible growth, we welcome them here any time. We don't turn to the courts lightly, but we have been put in a corner and given no chance at a fair dialogue," said Middleborough Select Board Chair Mark Germain. "If the state wants to see how responsible growth and expanding housing opportunities works when municipal government acts responsibly, then we would be happy to

show our leaders how what we have done should be a model for success statewide. Threatening and demanding compliance through draconian and capricious methods is not an effective way to achieve progress."

The state's Chapter 40B law requires communities to work toward a housing stock with 10 percent of units considered affordable. Middleborough's rate tops 13 percent today, and will top 14 percent with another Chapter 40B project about to be completed, and this is all not counting the 1,100 manufacturing housing units in Middleborough that meet the numerical definition of affordable housing but are not counted by the state's system. Middleborough exceeds the state requirement by 40 percent and has long been a leader in ensuring access to affordable housing

to affordable housing.

In filing suit, the Town seeks to halt what Middleborough contends is a broadsword approach to a much more delicate housing question statewide.

"One size does not fit all," Select Board Chair Germain said. "Middleborough has not only played by the rules but exceeded them and become a model for responsible growth and housing opportunities. The goalpost should not be moved arbitrarily."

When Gov. Healy stepped in last October to try to find a solution for preserving the Pink House, the greater Newbury and Newburyport community was optimistic that the governor's clout would succeed when ordinary citizens had not.

But on Friday, the governor issued a news release saying the efforts by her office, state Sen. Bruce Tarr, state Rep. Kristin Kassner and their staffs had failed.

"They hoped to achieve the win for all that has always been possible with The Pink House," the STPH board wrote. "Rest assured they met with the right people, including decision makers at the highest positions within FWS and the Interior Department.

Along with an anonymous \$1 million donation and several new parcels, most abutting refuges the refuge, were offered in exchange for the Pink House.

F&WS declined both the land and the money.

The million-dollar donation included the gift of restoring the Pink House, which would have increased its value to \$1.5 million or more.

When the million-dollar donor stepped forward, he offered to restore the house as a gift to FWS, that would have increased the value of the asset to \$1.5-2 million... which could have been traded for 3-4x new

acreage to conserve. That offer, while we're sure it was appreciated, was also declined.

F&WS set March 31 as the deadline for resolution, citing the migratory bird period. But birds migrate into June. The F&WS did not grant an extension, even when requested by the elected officials.

Instead, Matt Hillman, manager of the Parker River Wildlife Refuge, hired contractors to tear out wood that was contaminated with asbestos and other toxins.

As a result, the previously enclosed house has gone through the winter with few windows and part of the roof removed, leaving the house open to the element.

One supporter of the Pink House called it "demolition by default." ◆

In conversation with Dianne Plantamura about the rewilding of Veasey Park in Groveland, Mass. Diane is a board member of Freinds of Veasey Park and the founder of Veasey's Native Plant

Dianne often walked her dog throughout Veasey Park and observed areas that had become overgrown, needed restoration and additional plantings. Dianne became a Master Gardener in

1994 and in 2011 organized the planning and implementation of a native plant garden to demonstrate the value of native plant ecosystems to the public. Her goal was to create a living system composed of native trees, shrubs, and flowers. With the help of a team of volunteers, numerous invasive plants were removed, the compacted and depleted soil was cultivated and revitalized, and the native plants were planted. This area was so overgrown that, while removing invasive vines, Dianne discovered a mature crab apple tree that was hidden by a thicket of formidable invasive vines that had completely engulfed it. Later, three Eastern Red Bud trees were planted and were soon draped in Bittersweet vines. Dianne and her team quickly rescued the Red Buds and vanquished the offending Bittersweet. But Dianne was only beginning...

In 2022 she submitted an application to the Groveland Conservation Commission to use CPA funds for the rewilding project of Veasey Park. The plan was to establish a Miyawaki forest beginning in 2023. Initially, invasive vines and Norway Maples were removed, from approximately 9000 square feet, filling six dump trucks and rescuing two hidden American Elm tress. The area was successfully cleared and 4500 square feet was cultivated for planting.

Hang on. "Exactly what is a Miyawaki forest?" Well here goes...

The Miyawaki method is an afforestation technique invented in the 1970s by the Japanese Botanist, Akira Miyawaki. These small, densely planted - 1 plant per 18 inches - native forest ecosystems grow: 10x faster, 30x denser, 100x more biodiversity, and 16x more carbon sequestration than a conventionally planted forest.

The Miyawaki forest in Veasey Park was planted in April 2024
