With 60% Drop in Freshman Enrollment, Should Georgetown High School Close, Go Regional?

GEORGETOWN – The school district, suffering a declining student enrollment and a growing group of disgruntled parents, is considering several options including having Georgetown High School (GHS) students join a regional district.

The school board and Supt. Dr. Margo Ferrick have scheduled a series

of listening sessions, The Future of GHS - A Community Conversation, for parents to voice their concerns and ideas to fix challenges in the schools.

A group of concerned parents wrote the school asking the board and superintendent to issue a Request for Proposal by Sept. 30 for a feasibility study evaluating a possible school closure, regionalization or joining another

exhibit. "My intention is to not just capture the grace of the dancer's body, but the unspoken emotions that live between gesture and stillness.

The new exhibit, the store's third two-month art show in its well-lit back room, was installed over Labor Day weekend. It is Perry's third artist since she took down a wall to make the room large enough to house an art gal-

The official opening of the art show was held last week at Illume, 10 Market Square

"I'm thrilled" at being able to exhibit in the new gallery space, Spellman said.

Spellman, who moved to Newburyport in 1975 when the city was a less-affluent haven for artists, paints in oil and watercolor in her studio here. She began as a staff illustrator for a film strip company in Westport, CT, after graduating from Marymount College in Tarrytown, NY. She illustrated books by Donna Marie Seim, including children's books that are on the shelf at Illume.

But in recent years, she has focused her compositions on dance. The paintings feature dancers in various poses from jumps and extreme movements her way to Illume. •

to dancers at rest and reflection.

"Art and dance have been driving forces in my life," she said. She is a frequent participant in the dance classes at The Dance Place in the Tannery, owned by Fontaine Dollas Dubus.

"I am drawn to dancers because they embody vulnerability and strength at once," Spellman wrote. "Their movements reflect the paradox of being human: grounded yet striving, disciplined yet free, fragile yet powerful. I am aiming to reveal dance not only as performance, but as a dialogue between body, space and spirit."

Her love of movement, she said, even creeps into her landscape paintings.

Susan Kapuscinski Gaylord, a calligrapher, has posted her cards with quotations throughout the exhibit.

Elizabeth Lorayne, the first artist to have an exhibit at Illume, now serves as the store's curator. An artist, printmaker, award-winning author, ICF Associate Certified Coach, an accredited Jungian and Expressive Arts coach, Lorayne was followed in the

school district. The parents proposed that the study should be completed by the end of January.

The message from Supt. Dr. Margo Ferrick to the parents read: "Community members are expressing a sense of urgency around this due to the low ninth-grade enrollment numbers. I have been exploring and researching multiple options including redesigning GHS, tuition agreements with neighboring districts and creating a

the community into the conversation."

The current enrollment in Grade 9 is 32; Grade 10 is 66; Grade 11 is 61,

and Grade 12 is 70 for a total of 229. A decade ago, Georgetown High had 404 students. According to the letter from the parents, the freshmen class enrollment fell 60 percent in one year, 77 students in FY25 to 31 in FY26.

The listening sessions began this week and will continue on Sept. 30, Oct. 15 and 23.

The district also sent out a survey to parents, asking their thoughts on regionalization. One question asked whether they wanted the district to remain independent.

Another question was, "How important is it to you that Georgetown students have access to strong academic programs, sports and extracurricular opportunities, even if that means partnering with other districts?"

The survey outlined the choices the schools face

- Maintaining and redesigning Georgetown High School

The letter from the concerned parents read: "The situation is urgent. If we do not act now, doors will close that new regionalization. It is time to invite we may never be able to open again,

Georgetown this year approved and our children will I dren will be left behind."

Among the regionalization options would

be to join Masconomet Regional School District, which serves the towns of Boxford, Middleton and Topsfield. Masconomet has an enrollment of 562 students in its middle school and 955 students in the high school.

Triton, which serves Newbury, Rowley and Salisbury, has 127 students in its ninth grade. But the district is well along in the process of redesigning its 50-year-old high school and middle school with the Massachusetts School Building Assn. at its current enrollment levels.

Georgetown this year approved a \$6 million tax override largely because it provided more funds for the schools.

The 2025 override was essential to keep basic operations intact, but it cannot solve this enrollment crisis," the parents letter stated. "This challenge is about budgets and sustainability but it is also bigger than this—it is about whether Georgetown children will have the same chances to thrive

as those in surrounding communities and it is about a school system that is suffering rather than thriving."

The listening sessions are scheduled for 7 a.m. to 8 a.m. Sept. 30 at the Perley School, third floor; 6 to 7 p.m. Oct. 15 at the high school auditorium and from 11 a.m. to noon on Oct. 23 at the Perley School, third floor. ♦

Ipswich to Commemorate 285th Anniversary of the **Devil's Footprint Legend**

IPSWICH, MA – On Sunday, September 28, 2025, Ipswich will host a special event to celebrate the 285th anniversary of the Devil's Footprint legend. The celebration will take place on the Northwest Side of Meetinghouse Green and is free and open to the public. In case of rain, the event will be held inside First Church in Ipswich, UCC.

The legend, which dates back to 1740, tells the story of a dra-

matic showdown between the Devil and a young preacher named George Whitefield. According to the tale, the Devil was hiding behind a mirror in the North Congregational Church while Whitefield was preaching. Whitefield's fiery sermon shattered the mirror, and the Devil burst out. The two battled their way up the church steeple, where Whitefield cast the Devil down, leaving a single scorched hoofprint in a stone as he fled. The rock is still in Ipswich, and the story continues to be told and reinterpreted by each new generation.

The event, presented by First Church in Ipswich, UCC


