Bike Sharing Comes to Newburyport

NEWBURYPORT – The City of Newburyport has launched the Port Bikeshare pilot program, offering bicycles for rent at location along the city's Clipper City Rail Trail.

The program, which allows riders to use the Movatic app to locate, rent and return bikes, is a partnership among the city, Tandem Mobility and Newburyport Livable Streets, a non-profit organization which promotes safe and accessible transportation options in the city.

Five bikeshare stations are located

near the MBTA commuter rail station, at Washington Street, in Market Landing Park next to the American Yacht Club and off High Street at March's Hill.

The system includes 23 pedal bicycles and two recumbent trikes, which



were purchased by the Newburyport Commission on Disabilities.

Newbury Golf Center Adds High Tech Fun

NEWBURY - You're an avid golfer, but can't play St. Andrews or Pebble Beach this year? The Newbury Golf Center has the next best thing.

Less than a mile off Interstate 95 on Scotland Road, the 27-acre driving

range has added Top Tracer technology and monitors on all 30 bays. In each, a golfer has the opportunity to play and compete on one or more of the world's top 30 golf courses.

Toptracer Range, the ball-tracing technology used on televised PGA

GEORGETOWN SAND MINING OPERATION - Todd Champlain (excavator) and Kathy Potter (land owner of the 100-year-old Zibell Farm) are presenting contrasting stories to authorities, with Champlain now awaiting an early December court date, and Potter offering her former farm-turned-sandmining operation for sale (for the construction of homes/condos/whatever...).

This spring, Potter allowed hundreds of trucks, directed by Champlain to leave her property laden down with sand that was open-pit mined in her back yard. She has since claimed she got shortchanged in the deal, that Champlain misrepresented himself to the town, etc., and Champlain's history and court appearances leads one to believe part of such a story.

A few days before the town **shut down** her non-permitted mining operation in the residential neighborhood, various equipment used in the operation by Champlain disappeared from the site. Potter told police her ring camera from her home that sits with a front row seat to the operations, was of no use to investigators, as

she had erased all recordings and knew nothing.

Meanwhile, Town Administrator **Orlando Pacheco** told the SelectBoard that it is unknown what was buried in the land (past and present mining operations). Neighbors at multiple meetings have provided photos of construction debris being buried on the site at the mining spot, and other spots on the farm (grassed over now). No information has been made available by the town nor state as regards plans to unearth the potential ground-water contaminating substances, however, at press time, the The Town Common was informed that environmental protection agencies are finally, actively looking into the case and that several trucking firms could be potentially on the hook for remediation costs/fines as regards what they dumped there. More as we learn on the matter...

GEORGETOWN SELECTWOMAN KEEPING HER CANINE COMPANION - Despite a court order to hand over her dog, Daphne, to her soon-to-be ex-husband, Georgetown Selectwoman Rachel Bancroft has not done so and has appealed First Justice of the Essex Division of the Probate and Family Court Judge Frances M. Giordano's decree.

Bancroft faces fines imposed by the judge of \$200 per day for not surrendering her companion. (Visions of Daphne, larger than Toto, escaping from a basket and returning to her caregiver Dorothy/Rachel comes to mind.) Meanwhile, a recently shared video of Bancroft's husband taking a walk past her home, taking in the sights. Also, repeated postings on social media by residents elevated this public/private matter when calls for her ouster from her SelectBoard position became louder, citing an elected official's refusal to follow the direction of a judge.

The estranged couple is scheduled to begin a two-day formal trial in Salem the week before Thanksgiving to determine asset allocation and terms to settle this ongoing 2 1/2 year ordeal. ♦



system exceeded a drinking water standard, or maximum contaminant level (MCL, for a water disinfection byproduct (DBP)."

The letter recaps that "Chlorine or ozone are added to drinking water sources to disinfect drinking water. They can interact with natural material in the water to form DBP."

Since the detection of the contaminants, the department states that it took steps this summer to reduce the amount of water held in storage tanks to reduce stagnation. They will "also continue to look for potential causes and reduce the amount of disinfection byproduct precursors."

The letter notes that a "new pre-treatment filtration building is nearing its100% design completion and that it will improve our operations and water quality. We hope to put this project out to Bid soon.

The notice concludes with a request: "Please share this information with all the other people who drink this water, especially those who may not have received this notice directly (for example, people in apartments, nursing homes, schools, and businesses)."

agencies concerned with monitoring disinfection byproducts. They cite increased risk of cancer, problems with the liver, kidneys, and central nervous system.

The Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) fact sheet on haloacetic acids in drinking water from last year states: "Pregnant women or those who may become pregnant may be more susceptible to effects from chemicals such as those referred to as HAA5. Children (including infants) are generally considered more sensitive to the effects of chemicals like those of HAA5 than others in the general population and typically also consume more water for their size than adults.

"The degree of risk for these effects will depend on the HAA5 level and the duration of exposure. Consumption of water with HAA5 levels somewhat above the MCL for limited durations, for example, while corrective actions are being taken to lower the levels, is not likely to significantly increase risks of adverse health effects for most people.'

GEORGETOWN - After a moment of silent reflection followed by the Pledge of Allegiance, Robert Hoover, chair of the Georgetown SelecBoard read the phone numbers and locations of various food pantries in the area to assist residents with food short-

\$39/Month Increase for Retiree Premiums

GEORGETOWN - Health insurance premiums are going up for retired municipal employees. Currently retirees pay \$223/month for their Medex insurance. The new rate will be \$262.12 per month (Blue Cross Blue Shield Medicare gap coverage), according to Town Administrator Orlando Pacheco.

Pacheco told the SelectBoard last week that retirees will be notified this month of the \$39 per month increase.

Everyone, inside and outside of government is being hit by insurance premium increases. To put it in perspective, Selectman Doug Dawes

shared that his wife's premiums are rising not \$39/month but closer to \$100/month. Selectman Mike Donahue asked about timing on ways to modify plan options for employees.

Pacheco acknowledged that "we're in a tough position" but he saw opportunities to begin discussions on alternative plans, options, co-pays, etc., moving forward with discussions next year.

SelectBoard Chair Robert Hoover cautioned that FY28 will bring even more volatile costs: "it's going to change again in ways that people can't even imagine." ♦

Newbury Police Partners with First Parish Newbury Food Pantry

NEWBURY - With the increasing cost of groceries, the upcoming holiday season, and the uncertain future of SNAP benefits, the Newbury Police Department is partnering with the First Par-

ish Food Pantry of Newbury to make the police station an official 24-hour drop-off location.

The First Parish Newbury Food Pantry is the largest all-volunteer food pantry in the greater Newburyport area serving the communities of Newbury, Newburyport, Byfield, West Newbury, Salisbury, Rowley, Ipswich and Georgetown. The Pantry fills orders for over 800 people each week and stocks nine local school pantry programs.

About 35% of the Pantry's inventory is donated. Donations are accepted at the Pantry every Thursday from 9:30 a.m. to 1 p.m. or by

appointment.

Police Chief Patricia Fisher, who has partnered with the Pantry in the past by supporting donation drives and community outreach initiatives, recognized that with the risk of food insecurity increasing, a 24-hour donation site may encourage more residents to donate.

"Many people see Newbury and its villages as an affluent community, and it certainly has its aspects; however, emergency responders see firsthand that it's not everyone," said Chief Fisher. "We see the children, older adults, people with disabilities, low-income working families, veterans and domestic violence victims, struggling to remain living in this expensive area. We see people who are financially struggling move into rentals on Plum Island in the win-

Rentals cost \$3 for each half hour. A \$5 coupon is available through the end of November with the code RIDE5OFF.

Funding for the three-year program came mostly from a federal grant encouraging alternatives to driving. Additional support was provided by the Coastal Trails Coalition, the Institution for Savings Charitable Foundation, the Mary Alice Arakelian Foundation and the New Hampshire Charitable Foundation.

" As the proverb says, 'Little by little, a little becomes a lot,' we're simply offering the community a vehicle to give a little, so the Food Pantry can give a lot.'



tournaments to track the shots of the game's best players, allows golfers of all ages and ability levels to play a variety of fun and skill-based games, compete against friends, watch the flight of their shot and receive instant data on an interactive monitor behind each mat.

So, when a golfer drives a ball from the mat in Newbury, he or she can see how far the shot flew, whether it is toward the Pacific Ocean at Pebble Beach, down the wide fairways of the Scottish birthplace of golf or dozens of some of the best and most famous courses in the world.

"It's the wave of the future," said Eric Sorensen, president of the Newbury Golf Center.

Top Tracer is a game changer, he said. Players hit the ball, then turn to watch the flight of the ball on the monitor three feet away.

The Toptracer technology follows each ball's flight path on the monitor, records its distance and other "cool" metrics, its web site states.

'Golfers don't like hitting into a screen," Sorensen said, referring to indoor simulators.

As proof of that, he said, the average length of time a golfer practices at the center has risen from 20 minutes to an hour since Toptracer was installed. At \$17 per bucket of balls, the technology has not only changed the experience for the golfers, it has brought a wide grin to the PGA professional's face.

A board member for Top Golf that developed the new technology, Sorensen first installed the Top Tracer technology on the 10 covered and heated bays. But the demand proved so strong in the first year, he added the technology to the 20 outside bays as well.

This winter, Newbury Golf Center will again offer a tournament for players beginning Dec. 1. The center has partnered with the top golf software company, Golf Genuis, to offer live scoring and live leaderboards all winter.

With well over 100 players competing last winter, Sorensen expects to have 200 players this year.

The league is open to all levels of players. "If you are a beginner and looking to partner with a friend or a serious player with a handicap, this 12-week league is for you, the Newbury Golf Center's website said.

There will be both a handicap division and a non-handicap division for the casual golfer looking to get more comfortable on the golf course. The non-handicap division will be two-person teams.

All the leagues are "floating leagues," which means a player has a seven-day window to play the round for the week. And if you can't make a week, it can be made up.

Playing 18 holes will normally take an hour.

All levels of players, the beginner/ intermediate leagues are designed for someone with no handicap or a handicap higher than 30. The handicap leagues are designed for a player with a USGA handicap under 36.

The season costs \$100 per person, plus buying the range balls each week.

Plant Matters

In conversation with The Monarch Gardner.

I had the pleasure of meeting with Katie Banks Hone (aka,

by Ida Wye Banks Hone (aka, The Monarch Gardener) at her shop and nursery at Nutter Farm at 180 Ipswich Rd, Topsfield. I was deeply saddened by the death of Jane Goodall and asked Katie if she had been inspired by Dr Goodall and I shared a quote by her "Small actions by individuals can make the world a better place," to begin our conversation. Katie then brought me into her shop and showed me a quote from Dr Goodall that she featured on her wall! I knew I had come to the right place. Both Jane Goodall and Katie are optimists.

Katie is an ecologist who worked as an educator at The New England Aquarium and completely converted her Ipswich property to a native garden hosting 90 native plant species on 1/3 acre. Soon after, she began growing milkweed (to feed Monarch butterflies) and selling plants at farmer's markets. I asked her why milkweed and Monarchs and she explained that Monarch butterflies are a gateway pollinator because they are charismatic and everyone loves butterflies. Today, Katie grows and sells an extraordinary collection of native plants that sustain pollinators.

Her website offers a lengthy list of native plants for sale including trees, shrubs, vines, annuals, grasses and over 100 perennials. In addition to plants, Katie sells books, signs, tee shirts, rabbit manure and seed balls. Her business has grown over the last 11 years and she works every day, seven months out of the year. She believes in acting locally and some of her merchandise is locally produced. She is committed to sustainability and organic plant production. She uses Coast of Maine Soil and collects and uses only rainwater and solar pumps. She donates a portion of all sales to Monarch and conservation groups. Although the Monarch population is below the viable level, the population did increase last year.

Katie shared some useful information and suggestions for better understanding native plants for pollinators. You do not need to only include plants from your town. Select from Ecoregion 59 which is a vast area. Dr Robert Gegear's recommended plant list provides plants for pollinators at risk from the Gegears Lab at Umass-Dartmouth and the spreadsheet of plants on her website links to The Biota of North America (BONA) simply by clicking on the plant name. (BONA is a comprehensive plant database.)

I'd like to thank Katie for making time for me to visit her shop and nursery. Please support local growers and add some native plants to your home gardens. You may want to try using some of Katie's seed balls. Many of the seeds are collected locally and the seed balls can be tossed into a field or pressed into garden soil. An ideal time to do this is Autumn.

Ida Wye is the principal of Ida Wye Designs, offering landscape design, consultation, implementation, and restoration. Ida was green long before it was fashionable. She is committed to creating gardens that heal our planet, one landscape at a time. Ida graduated from U. Mass. Amherst with a B. S. in Plant and Soil Sciences before working for the U.S. D. 


