
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



# Rowley to Celebrate Purple Heart Recipients - Sat. Nov. 8th

**ROWLEY** – The town will honor Purple Heart recipients at a ceremony Saturday, November 8, 2025 at 11:00 am. at the Star Garden next to Town

The ceremony will recognize two local Purple Heart recipients, Chet Bishop and Nick Ford.

The Purple Heart is the nation's oldest military medal, created by Gen. George Washington as the Badge of Military Merit in 1782. It was revived in 1932 as the medal it is today.

Bishop, a Vietnam War veteran, received two Purple Hearts during his service. He was in the Navy and assigned to river boat duty in Vietnam. He received his first Purple Heart while manning a 50-caliber machine gun when an RPG hit the boat and

he was wounded. After spending time in the hospital, he was reassigned to another river boat. On that mission, he was in the wheelhouse when the boat was again hit by an RPG, resulting in a more severe wound.

Ford, a special-operations combat veteran who served in Iraq and Afghanistan, served with the U.S. Army's 75th Ranger Regiment as an Assault Team Member. In 2005, his team carried out a raid against a High

# Georgetown Sand Wars Update: **Police Arrest Excavator**

**GEORGETOWN** – The controversial sand mining operation that has been on-going for months at 214 North St. erupted last week in criminal charges of larceny, lying and forgery against Todd Champlain, who billed himself as the manager of the 100-year-old Zibell Farm.

Police Chief David Sedgwick announced that with assistance from the Danvers and Middleton Police Departments, his department arrested 41-year-old Champlain of Middleton Friday, following a lengthy investigation. He was scheduled for arraignment in Haverhill District Court Monday.

Georgetown Police also determined that Champlain was working at the farm under false pretenses. In August, Champlain was taken into custody on an undisclosed, unrelated warrant,

The chief said police initially

Champlain is charged with two felony counts for forging owner Kathy Potter's signature on documents filed with the town regarding the sand mining, two felony counts of "uttering false writings" and one count of larceny. He was also accused of taking \$30,000 from the property owner and that he sold more than \$200,000 worth of sand without reimbursing

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

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
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### **Harvey Mades**

# Hometown Heroes Banner Program Honors Georgetown Veterans

**GEORGETOWN** – As Veterans Day approaches, we extend our appreciation to all service members for their contributions to the country and communities

Our friend, Jon Pingree was jogging in a small town in Maine, and noticed all the banners of veterans, up on their utility poles. Jon decided this was a great idea, and partnered, and spearheaded, with the Kiwanis organization in Georgetown. He brought the idea forward, the Kiwanis is a charitable organization which performs various services for the town: a Senior Thanksgiving Dinner, they donate to food pantries, tree lighting at Christmas, Wreaths Across America, and many more.

This program is called Hometown Heroes. The program displays 24" x 36" banners on utility poles from May

1 through the end of November and eran's name, years of service, rank, and here, etc. The criteria are pretty liberal. spotlights local veterans with a link to Georgetown.

Banners are produced in minimum batches of five and cost \$195 each but there are provisions for financial assistance (see below). The program currently plans to continue through May 2026; organizers advise confirming availability and deadlines when ordering. Thanks to groups providing financial support, the criteria for a free banner are as follows: you work for the town, or have a relative who was killed in action, or you have a financial hard-

The program is for people that are alive or who have passed. To qualify, they need to have some connection to Georgetown - either they grew up here or have a family member that lives

In addition to all the work and

funding by the Kiwanis, there were many people who have helped this program: Dave Schofield, now retired

general manager of Georgetown Electric Light, initiated the effort with 46 banners.

Frank Harper arranged thousands in donated funds from the Georgetown VFW Post No. 7608 to the Kiwanis which donated \$3,000 to get the program launched

Awesome Georgetown (a local philanthropic organization\*) donated \$1,500 to the cause.

Nick Lawler of Georgetown, who worked with Scott Edwards to provide a donation of bannermounting brackets.

Mark Perry, also from the Kiwanis, and Georgetown Municipal Light Dept., was also heavily involved with making the hometown heroes banner program come to fruition.

Selectman Doug Dawes gave Jon Pingree and the Kiwanis 10 free names from the vets/VFW to be made into banners.

**Mary Snow**, the new general manager of the Georgetown Municipal Light Department, will coordinate banner installation and removal each season.

received several reports of large commercial activity and traffic on the property. Neighbors had been complaining for months to the town about the huge volume of dump truck, sifters and bulldozers that were removing sand from the farm through their neighborhood. The trucks and equipment operated long hours to the dismay of the neighbors.

Champlain told The Town Common that the valuable sand was being sold to concrete manu-

The police served seven traffic violations on Champlain on the sand removal.

"I want to recognize the Georgetown Police Detectives who used their skills and experience to bring this case to a conclusion," Chief Sedgwick said. "Thank you to the Danvers and Middleton Police Departments and the Essex County Sheriff's Office for their support and

In August, the Lawrence Superior Court

ordered the mining operation at the farm to cease, acting on a motion by town attorneys, who argued that Robles Excavating Co., Champlain and Potter were mining the sand without permits from the town.

At a recent meeting of the SelectBoard and Board of Assessors, Georgetown Town Manager Orlando Pacheco said the farm is in the process

Pacheco said the property would most likely be under agreement for sale to an unnamed developer "by December first. (Mary Potter is) going to sell the property, the whole property."

The 100-year-old farm has 28 acres, five of which were being mined for its sand. The plan was to mine other 5-acre parcels for the valuable sand, Champlain told the Planning Board.

Town half sources confirmed that the future developer has met with the planning, conservation and other offices investigating the property, reviewing maps, asking about utilities, water, and determining any offsets and any limitations on placing an untold number of homes/townhouses/apartments on the parcel. •

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




