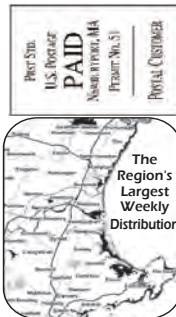

West Newbury Bridge 7+ Years Later

WEST NEWBURY – Closed to vehicles for more than seven years, the Middle Street/Plummer Springs Bridge on the border of West Newbury and Newburyport now has a deck over the Upper Artichoke Reservoir, the drinking water supply for both communities.

According to West Newbury officials, construction on the project is ahead of schedule, although peat was discovered in the ground below the bridge, which would not support the bridge's foundation. The peat is

scheduled to be excavated this summer. The schedule was delayed two months earlier.

Costing West Newbury and Newburyport each \$275,000, the bridge is scheduled to be completed before November. The bridge's construction costs are offset by a \$1 million-grant to West Newbury from the state's MassWorks and separate MassDOT Small Bridge grants to West Newbury and Newburyport of \$750,000 each. West Newbury also used \$25,000 of its American Rescue Plan Act funds in January 2024

Newburyport Whale Watching and the Plight of Whales

NEWBURYPORT – If you love whales, the Custom House Maritime Museum has got a treat waiting for you.

On 2026's first First Friday lecture, Kristin Daley, a marine naturalist at the Newburyport Whale Watch

"Take a deep dive with naturalist Kristin Daley into the biology, behavior, migration and communication of whales in our Gulf of Maine backyard," announced Julia Bradley-LaBonte, the museum's senior manager. "What helps these giants thrive, and what threatens them? Learn about

conservation, protection efforts, and stories from the water that bring this ecosystem to life closer to you."

Daley is a marine naturalist with the whale watch and a traveling ocean educator with The Whalemobile. She has spent nine seasons studying whales primarily in the Gulf of Maine, Hawai'i and South Africa.

Plant Matters

Let us just burn *Burning Bush*.

I've been concerned about "introduced" ornamental plants from countries outside the USA since I worked for the U.S.D.A. (U. S. Department of Agriculture) in the Port of New York. I have been working in the green industry over the last four decades and have become alarmed by the negative impact that 'invasive' ornamental plants have had on local ecosystems. One shrub that has been classified as a *significant threat* to local ecosystems is *Euonymus alatus* which was introduced from Asia. This shrub - commonly known as *Burning Bush* or *Winged Euonymus* - is prized for red and persistent fall foliage. Masses of these plants have been deliberately planted from parking lots to suburban plots.

So how did this plant become a menace to local ecosystems? It can grow almost anywhere, from deep shade to full sun, in any soil type as well as from dry to wet conditions. It is such an unappealing meal to wildlife that even deer abhor it and do not impede its rampant colonization. This miscreant is successfully competing with native plants that are essential for forest succession and bird migration. Climate change is providing a strategic advantage to *Burning bush*. Birds need vital calories for successful migration and are migrating later due to climate change, but many of the native plants that provide the most nutrient dense berries are ripening before birds begin their journey. Consequently, birds are consuming berries that are produced later and are more persistent. *Burning Bush* berries are abundant at this crucial time but provide less nutrition. Birds must eat more of these berries and, inadvertently, consume and disperse *Burning Bush* disproportionately to native plants

and is growing in impenetrable thickets in forests and along road sides.

The best remedy is to remove this bully from your landscape and plant native trees and shrubs that provide outstanding autumn colors and high functional value to our shared ecosystem. The following is a list of native plants to consider adding to your landscape.

Trees

Cantemus Invites Tenor and Bass Singers to Audition



A New Gateway to Plum Island

PLUM ISLAND – The character of residences on this 11-mile barrier island has been undergoing major change over the last decade. Once a popular vacation destination where people from all over the Northeast rented cottages to enjoy the beach.

Sunburned, hungry and thirsty, the beachgoers would gather at one of a handful of bars and restaurants, most notably the Plum Island Grille, where they watched the sun set over the Great Salt Marsh.

“The Plum Island Grille has a glorious past,” said Mark Friery, who once owned and operated the grille and now is selling the property probably as two spectacular condos that will have balconies and decks on three levels offering views not only of the marsh, but the Atlantic as well.

“For anyone serious about living on the island to find a place that has such spectacular views, it’s a dream come true,” Friery said.

The island is rapidly transitioning from a beach community to an urban village, said veteran Realtor Frank Bertolino with The North Shore Realty Group last week. Summer residents

once knew only those who came with them. “Now, everybody knows everybody,” Bertolino said.

Approved plans for this 12,000-square-foot gateway lot, the Residences at 2 Sunset Blvd., is for two townhomes with a total of 4,100 square feet. Each home would have three bedrooms and 2.5 baths. Built on stilts to protect against flooding, the building, as designed, would have a Key West feel, but the architect Scott & Brown can make any changes a developer or builder choose.

The master suite with a full bath is on the second floor and opens to the balcony where the owners can relax with a coffee or cocktail. The second floor in each home also has two more bedrooms, another full bath and a sitting room or office.

ing down, Bertolino said interest from builders and developers in this property, listed at \$1,375,000, has been growing rapidly. Compared to other island listings, “This is a deal,” Friery said.

Particularly appealing is that Friery at his expense has secured approval from the town of Newbury, which saves a buyer both money and months of time.

Having those permits, “Anything is possible,” Bertolino said. It could be a made into a six-bedroom, five-bath single-family home or family compound

on one of the region’s most popular beaches.

Or a developer can take on the project and sell each townhome for about \$1.9 million, Bertolino said.

For those who pine for a restaurateur to restore the Plum Island Grille of old, it was not for lack of trying by Friery and Bertolino.

“We had restaurateurs here looking at the space from as far away as New York City,” Bertolino said.

But each prospect, after running the

financials, concluded that the Grille could not be restored after the custom-made bars and interior was vandalized when the restaurant was closed.

The market for Plum Island restaurants has also changed. The popular Sunset Club was built on the site of an old gasoline station across the street. And nearby Newburyport offers an array of well-frequented restaurants.
