West Newbury Archelaus Hill Maple Farm Open House Saturday

Massachusetts declared the month of March as Maple Month in a press release from the Massachusetts Department of Agricultural Resources (MDAR) last week. Maple Month will also be marked by Maple Weekend, happening on Saturday, March 7th, and Sunday, March 8th, when sugarhouses around the state will open their doors to visitors for tours of their operations, where they can learn about the maple sugaring process and the rich history behind the sector. Most importantly, visitors will be able to sample and purchase freshly produced maple sugar products. Maple sugaring is one of the few agritourism activities available during the early months of the year. Between March and April, over 60,000 visitors spend more than \$2 million during the sugaring season. Farms, restaurants, bed and breakfasts, country inns, and other tourist businesses share this income, primarily flowing into small towns and farm communities, supporting the rural

economy. In Essex County, there are a number of maple sugarhouses spread through the towns. West Newbury has two sugarhouses; Merrimac and Byfield have one; there is another in Topsfield; and one in Wilmington.

For Maple weekend, Archelaus Hill Maple Farm will open their doors to the public from 12-5 PM on Saturday, March 7th at 288 Middle Street in West Newbury. Archelaus Hill Maple Farm is a small, family run operation with about 250 maple taps.

West Newbury Water Issue

Message from the Water Department
WEST NEWBURY – The West Newbury Water Department purchases water from Newburyport. The City of Newburyport's Water Dept. have recently alerted us to issues that might affect the water users in West Newbury. Please see their message below:

"The taste and odor some residents are noticing are related to natural conditions in the reservoirs, especially during periods of ice cover and seasonal changes in the water. These events can cause naturally occurring compounds in the water to become more noticeable. While the taste and smell may be unpleasant, this is strictly an aesthetic issue and does not pose any health risk.

The only effective way to remove this type of taste and odor is through Granular Activated Carbon (GAC) filtration. The current treatment facil-

ity does not include GAC, but the new treatment plant will have GAC built into its filtration system.

The City's Water Division continues to closely monitor water quality leaving the treatment plant to ensure it meets all state and federal drinking water standards."

If you are experiencing a different taste or odor it is due to natural conditions, which does not pose any health risk.

Georgetown Water Warning Reminder

Elevated Disinfection Byproducts at Georgetown Water Department

GEORGETOWN – Last Fall, residents received a detailed double-sided notice in the mail advising them the water they have been drinking has been "in violation," on-going, since May 2025.

Under the headline of "What should you do?" the letter states: "You can choose to limit the amount of tap water used if you are pregnant, may become pregnant or are giving water to young children. For example, you can use water from another source, such as bottled water."

In italicized type, they write "Some people who drink water containing haloacetic acids in excess of the MCL over many years may have an increased risk of getting cancer."

The Game Must Go On

NEWBURY – The annual winter tournament at the Newbury Golf Center is in rare company as one of only three other golf tournaments, led by the 1962 AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am, that had to postpone their conclusion because of a snow storm.

The Newbury Golf Center's 10-week tournament, the brainchild of PGA professional and center

owner Erik Sorensen, was in its final week when the snow storm of '26 dumped almost two feet on the golf center. Sorensen and Terry Lavin, tournament manager, were forced to extend the competition another week to accommodate players and allow them time to rack up their final points in the competition.

Being the last week, some competitors, who had finished their rounds with playoff-qualifying scores, were not thrilled at the extension, Lavin said. "At the end, it gets pretty competitive."

The tournament, which had 110 competitors in various divisions for its second season, is played from the center's 10 heated and covered bays and 20 uncovered bays. The Top Tracer computers, which provide several dozen courses for players to use at each bay, track the flight of the balls.

The center, which is less than a mile off I-95 on Scotland Road, uses the Stableford Scoring system where the goal is to accumulate the highest total points. Par nets two points; a bogey one; three for a birdie, and four for eagles.

Kelly McInnis of Newburyport, who won the women's division with her partner, Kathleen Ammon, last year, said, "it's been a great way to stay connected to golf during the long winter months. Being outdoors and hitting into the range keeps the experience true to the game, and it's also created a nice opportunity to meet golfers in the community."

"The tracking technology has been

especially helpful, particularly in understanding my club distances and improving my consistency."

What McInnis especially likes about the winter tournament is she can complete the tournament at her own pace. Some players finish one course per week, while she and others complete the 10 rounds in 10 days.

In 1962, a rare snowstorm hit the Monterey Peninsula, CA, forcing the final round of Pebble Beach to be moved to Monday. (Ironically, one of the 10 courses the tournament plays through Top Tracer is Pebble Beach.) In 2011 and 2013, at the WGC-Accenture Match Play championship, winter storms dumped several inches of snow on Dove Mountain in Arizona, forcing the tournament to be suspended.

Sorensen estimated that golfers at the 27-acre Newbury Golf Center, the largest golf practice facility on the North Shore, have hit about 1,000 balls this winter into the snow in front of the heated bays. "When the snow melts, it's going to look like there is still snow on the ground," he said.

This year, the tournament added a cell phone app, Golf Genius, which tracks each player's points and ranks them on a leader board. "That creates a lot of excitement," Lavin said.

The cost of the tournament is \$100 per player plus the fee for the balls. Prizes are awarded to all teams in the playoffs with other prizes during the season.

"It's been a good tournament," Lavin said. ♦

Seacoast Composite Squadron of Civil Air Patrol in Portsmouth to Host Open House on March 12

You are invited to come to the Seacoast Composite Squadron Open House on Thursday, 12 March 2026, beginning at 6:30 P.M., at the Service Credit Union, 3003 Lafayette Road, Portsmouth, NH.



Civil Air Patrol (CAP) is an all-volunteer auxiliary of the United States Air Force. The Portsmouth Squadron was founded in 1941 and is the longest continuously Operational CAP Squadron in New Hampshire. The Squadron meets on Thursday evenings on the Pease ANG Base.

Civil Air Patrol members range in age from 12 to 18 years old for Cadets and 18 and older for Senior members. All members may participate in the three primary missions of CAP: Search and Rescue, Aerospace Education, and Cadet Programs.

Among their many activities, CAP Cadets are eligible for 5 flights in a powered aircraft, during which time they will have the opportunity to fly the airplane with a CAP pilot.

Cadets can also participate in areas such as Squadron Color Guard, drill

team, ground team search and rescue, building and testing a wind tunnel, aerospace education, leadership pods, and many more things.

Senior members can participate as aircrew members, ground search team search and rescue team leaders, and in many more activities such as leading and teaching in Cadet Programs. If a Senior Member is already a certified pilot, he/she can become qualified in one of CAP's Cessna 182 aircraft as a pilot performing CAP

missions.

There will be displays at the Open House showcasing the many areas in which a CAP member may become involved, and many members of the Squadron will be present to show you their areas of expertise.

Northeast Harvest to Host Agricultural Conference at Topsfield Fairgrounds on March 19th





Therrien Under Attack Again

The water board had several projects under ConCom review, and Aaron Needleman was before the commission on an issue involving his house.

That left only three voting members, not enough for a voting quorum.

"I did not want to waste taxpayers money and the public's time by holding a meeting that could not accomplish anything," Therrien said.

Amy Graffum, the ConCom vice chair, said, "This has nothing to do with the chair. We did not have a voting quorum. We couldn't vote on anything."

Therrien put Lawler's issue on the next agenda.

Therrien, who is also an elected member of the SelectBoard, has been attack from fellow SelectBoard member Michael Donahue for several years. He recently submitted a 195-page complaint against Therrien, accusing Therrien of being incompetent and asking the SelectBoard to remove her from the board.

A review of the 195 pages showed it to be a collection of emails and police reports that stemmed mostly from a dispute between the Town Administrator Orlando Pacheco and the former conservation director, who left town employment three years ago. Therrien was involved only as the then-vice chair of the ConCom, who protected the commission's employee.

Lawler is also asking that the ConCom be reduced in size from seven members to five to avoid the quorum issues. That reduction requires a vote of Town Meeting by town residents. ♦

GEORGETOWN – The Conservation Commission (ConCom) last week did not have enough members attending the scheduled meeting to make up a required voting quorum. As a result, the meeting was canceled.

As a result, ConCom member Nick Lawler has asked that the commission vote at its next meeting on removing the chair Rachel Therrien.

In an email to the conservation director, Michele Grenier, who is the lone staffer for the ConCom, Lawler wrote: "This is the second time in three months that we have not had a quorum, and it has not been communicated to the full Commission in a timely manner."

"The last time we were notified an hour or two before the meeting. I changed a flight ... to make the meeting just to come home and find out it was cancelled. Last night my wife changed her dinner plans so that I could give my full attention to the meeting while she took care of our three children. Last night I found out the meeting was cancelled at 7 pm when I logged into the meeting and just you were in the Zoom room."

The meeting of the seven-member commission was canceled just before 6 p.m. when member Daryl LaMonica told Therrien he could not attend. Member Ida Wye had already said she could not attend. Two other members, including Lawler, who is also a water board member, were involved with issues on the agenda and could not vote.
